


UPDATE FROM RABBITS

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UPDATE FROM SQUIRRELS

Despite a wet start to the second half of the term Squirrel class have still managed to take lots of their learning outside. We have continued to develop our allotment and are now preparing to plant our seeded potatoes. In preparation for this planting we made our metre sticks as part of numeracy/DT. We measured pieces of wood, cut them to size using different types of saws, and of course using our maths skills, we marked out every 10 cm until we reached one metre. We sanded and decorated our own metre sticks and used them to plant out seeds. In order to do all of the above our learners needed to demonstrate and acquire the learning habits of; exploring, problem solving, working together and the ability to overcome challenges we faced.









Our focus for part of Reading Week were some of the stories from the worldrenowned author Julia Donaldson; we read most of her books over the course of the week and used 'Superworm' and 'Snail and the Whale' as the inspiration for our scientific research on both snails and worms. We used our learning powers of noticing, question, working together exploring to research, observe, create and investigate both animals.







As ever we continue to develop our passion for reading and love of books by exploring a wide range of stories, our current book is 'Dear Greenpeace'. The coming weeks will see our learning channel off into a variety of directions including; looking at the role of Greenpeace, letter writing, habitats, whale migration, environment al issues, peaceful protests and many more avenues of learning. We will be asking lots of questions, demonstrating our curiosity, learning together and also explaining our thoughts, opinions and our learning experiences.







We celebrated Pancake Day by having a pancake each and choosing our topping. This term we welcome our new Judo teacher with sessions taking place on a Wednesday, we also aim to arrange a number of out of school visits to the local community.


REQUEST: We are looking for donations of unwanted /old wellies and outdoor clothing such as waterproofs. All sizes welcome.

UPDATE FROM SIMMONDS

22.2. 22200. In Simmonds Class, we have been designing and making our own clocks this term. We had to use our "Getting Ready" Learning muscle to plan:

- Who the clock could be for?
- Where it could go?
- What theme it would have?
- What materials we could use to make it?



We then used our ICT skills to research novelty clocks and choose which one we preferred. We linked our final design to our Maths work, where we had been learning about different 2D shapes. We choose a 2D shape that we would like our clock to be and then searched for an image for the background. Miss Coyte added the numbers and Mrs Pohorely stuck our pictures on to MDF and cut out the shape, it was a little rough around the edges so we had to sand them down to make them smooth. We

were then lucky enough to go into Mrs Pohorely's DT room to drill the hole into our clocks for the mechanism. We had to wear safety goggles, to protect our eyes and an apron to protect our uniform. Mrs Pohorely showed us how to turn the drill on and off using the switches and then each child had a go at turning it on and lowering the drill to make the hole. We were very sensible and Miss Coyte was very proud of our behaviour in there. Finally we painted the handles of the clock blue and red to know which is the minute hand and which is the hour hand. We put our clocks together and checked they worked. Jacob said "I am so proud of my clock, now it will tell the time every day."

UPDATE FROM SIMMONDS

Simmonds Class have been looking at the 'Aliens Love Underpants' series by Claire Freedman. We started off the week designing our own alien in underpants and describing them. We had pants all over the class room, but on Thursday somebody stole our pants. Charles noticed the thief left some "evidence" at the scene of the crime. We finished off the week on Friday writing our own version of the story choosing a new group to love underpants






Here is Jacob's story:








UPDATE FROM **YEAR 11**







The <u>Crisis Helpline</u> is staffed by professionals who are experienced in working with people with mental health issues and is managed according to the NHS Code of Confidentiality which respects individuals' personal information. However, the service has a duty to respond when someone's thoughts, intentions and actions indicate a specific and significant risk of harm to self or others particularly children). Such cases will be followed up and the relevant service or authorities will be contacted. In an emergency please call 999 or go to Accident and Emergency (A&E) – many of which have psychiatric liaison services. You can find local A&E services at <u>NHS Choices</u>.

Out of hours crisis support for children with a mental health need.

Out of hours crisis support for children, young people and their families has been increased in response to Coronavirus. Children, aged 11 and over, and their families can continue to call our Extended Hope Service for crisis support between 5pm-11pm, 7 days a week. Calls to this service are handled by the Emergency Duty Team and we have now put in place a triage worker to provide an immediate response to anyone calling this number: 01483 517898. In addition, our Mental Health Crisis Helpline is now providing telephone support to children, young people and their families between 11pm and 9am, seven days a week, to ensure they always have access to out of hours crisis support. During normal working hours people can talk to their GP or go to A&E for support and children, aged 10-18, can contact one of the CYP Havens.

Due to public health advice the CYP Havens are currently closed. Instead we are running a virtual service for young people to access support by phone. This service is available every day of the week including bank holidays
