Occupational Therapy enhances engagement and participation in school life

The Occupational Therapy service is jointly commissioned by Health and Education and provided by Children and Family Health Surrey (NHS) to meet the Health and Education needs of children attending Special Schools in Surrey.

The aim is to provide an Occupational Therapy service that is integrated throughout each special school setting, in partnership with parents/carers, teachers, school staff and other professionals to help children achieve their full potential.

What does Occupational Therapy focus on in Special Schools?

The Occupational Therapy service provides assessment, intervention, advice and environmental adaptations/equipment to help address the difficulties a child/young person may be experiencing with engagement and participation in occupations of daily life including:

- Self-care (regulating emotions and sensory needs, dressing, grooming, feeding)
- School skills (focus and attention, using tools including pencils, scissors, PE)
- Leisure activities (choices in free time, relaxation, play)

The OT team uses a person, occupation, environment approach to intervention ensuring that all factors are considered to enable children/young people to achieve their potential. How are Occupational Therapy services provided in Special Schools?

Most Special Schools will have a named Occupational Therapist(s) and sometimes Occupational Therapy assistant. Input may be direct or indirect depending on the needs of the child and includes:

Whole class or whole School (universal)

input which empowers school staff and families to use a range of strategies embedded within daily routines

Targeted or group input to build school staff and family skills through modelling specialist strategies and delivering programmes:
